Adobe Photoshop was originally developed by Thomas Knoll in 1987. In 1991, ImageReady was released along with Photoshop. In 1995, the program was re-released as Photoshop, with a new interface and new features such as filters, solid colors, and even curves. Since then, Adobe has constantly updated Photoshop to keep up with current trends and industry standards, releasing new versions every few years. The most recent version was released in July 2014, and the current version is version CS6. Photoshop is often used for commercial and professional work, due to its versatility and power. In this Photoshop tutorial, I am going to show you how to create a Photoshop photo collage, which means to put different images together to create a collage. A collage is a flat print (i.e. not a framed print), and it is usually used as a memento. Photoshop collages are relatively easy to make, and they are one of the most common types of "handmade" photoshoots. I'm going to show you how to

do this in Adobe Photoshop with a brief description of how the process works. Learning Photoshop is a time-consuming endeavor, but it is worth the price of admission to learn these amazing and versatile tools. If you want to learn Photoshop, I highly recommend the Photoshop Certified Associate (PCA) program. Step 1: Create the Environment The first step in Photoshop is to create the environment that you will be working in. File > New > Document: Create a New Document In the New Document window that pops up, give your Photoshop document the proper dimensions. For a collage like this, I suggest a width and height of 2000 x 2000 pixels. Once you have set the appropriate dimensions, click OK. Step 2: Create the Backdrop Next, we need to create a Photoshop backdrop, or a white image that serves as a background for the rest of the image. Go to File > New and then Click "Greyscale" in the Color Chooser. Under "Output," make sure that Grayscale is selected, and change the color to Cyan. Then, click OK. A new window will open with a pre-made Grayscale image. If you look at this image, you will notice that it is not large enough to be a backdrop. If this is the first time that you are using Photoshop, you may be

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This Photoshop review is primarily for people using Photoshop elements, so you can use this tutorial as a guide. Home The Home tab contains all the icons you need to quickly access all the commands and features in Photoshop. It has lots of buttons, including the Go menu

with a variety of tools. This is the main menu for all the features in Photoshop. You can access the other menus by clicking on the buttons in the upper left hand corner.

Toolbox The toolbox contains all the tools you need to edit your image. The tools in this tab are divided into 16 categories: Most of the tools are located under Tools, but you can also find Filters, Adjustments, Adjustment Layers, Gradients, and many other tools. All the tools in this section can be used to edit your image. You can

access the tools in the toolbox by clicking on the dropdown menu to the left of the tool that you want to use. **Toolbox Example** The default view of Photoshop Elements, as seen when it is first opened, only shows the tools that are relevant to the current task. So, if you have a standard workflow in Photoshop, nothing will show unless you click on the button. But, if you want to see all the tools in the toolbox, then click on the button with the dotted line to expand the toolbox and you will see every tool available. **Layer Panel** The Layers panel in Photoshop

Elements is where you create and edit all your layers.

This is the main panel to use to design a photo or graphic. The Layers panel has four parts: the Layers section at the top, the Layer Styles panel in the middle, the adjustment controls panel on the right, and the Visibility Control panel. The Layers panel contains four tabs for layers, the Layer Styles panel, the Adjustment Controls panel, and the Visibility Control panel. **Layer** The main window for Layers is shown in the screenshots above. You can use all the tools in the toolbox to edit your image, such as the Brush, Pencil, Text, and Options tools. The tools in this window can be accessed by

House of Mortimer The House of Mortimer was a medieval English royal line. Its present best-known member is the 13th century English magnate Simon de Montfort, 6th Earl of Leicester. One of the earliest known members of this line was Roger de Mortimer, one of the two sons of King Stephen of England. The two men fought alongside one another in the brief civil war of 1135–54 known as the Anarchy between the Empress Matilda and her stepson Henry II of England. Roger de Mortimer and his younger brother Ivo, 6th Earl of Gloucester, were the first to be reconciled with Henry. In 1141 Roger de Mortimer was formally crowned king of Ireland at Cashel. The conflict between Henry and his mother also led to the expulsion of many of Roger de

Mortimer's supporters and loyal knights in 1145. De Mortimer was banished to Ireland, where he died in 1148. In the meantime, in England the civil war between Matilda and Henry the Lion was over by 1147. Henry's claim to be the lawful heir, based on the terms of the Treaty of Corbeil of 1128, had not been challenged by Matilda. In fact, many of those who had fought for her were now imprisoned by Henry in the Tower of London. Roger de Mortimer was also imprisoned at Corfe Castle. Even though Roger's brother Ivo de Mortimer had died in 1139, Roger de Mortimer kept the title "lord of Albemarle" until his death. Roger de Mortimer married Isabel de Clare (1116 - 12 April 1161), daughter of Gilbert fitz Richard, 2nd Earl of Clare, by his wife Eleanor of England. Their son Simon de Mont

What's New In?

Photoshop Elements provides a special Brush in the Toolbox for tracing over your photo. Click the Brush in the Tools panel, and then click the Trace button to see the brush cursor open. (If you don't see the Brush, click the arrow at the top-right of the Toolbox until you see it, then click the Brush in the panel.) You'll see a brush cursor, similar to the one in the following image. As shown in Figure 9-2, you can trace an image at any time by setting your cursor to the Brush tool, then tracing over the pixels you want to copy from the original image. Use the Selection tool to click and drag over areas of your image. When you release the mouse button, Photoshop Elements creates a selection around the areas

you clicked. The tool provides many options for changing the size, shape, and opacity of the selection. You can make selections from different areas of the same image or from different images. The Eraser tool is used to remove items from an image, such as a star, which may cause trouble if you try to paste it elsewhere. To erase an area, position the cursor over the area you want to erase and use the Eraser tool to make a quick selection of the area to remove. When you're done, use the Eraser tool on a blank spot of your image. The Quick Selection tool works in a similar way to the magic wand tool, as covered in the next section. **Figure 9-2:** Using the Brush tool to copy sections of an image. Quick Select

When you've found a place in an image you want to add something, you might want to quickly "select" that area to apply a different effect or find the right place to add text. For example, the previous section shows how to use the Brush tool to paint around specific areas. When the Brush tool is selected, click the Quick Select button on the Toolbox panel to insert a box around the area that was selected. Photoshop Elements then changes its cursor to look like a Quick Selection tool; you can move it around the image and click to add other elements (such as another layer or a selection) to the image. The Quick Selection tool helps you select any area of the image you want to add something to and quickly find the right place to add text. As you can see in Figure 9-3, the Quick Selection tool has the same appearance and functions as the
